2023 NATIONAL POLICE WEEK

President Kennedy in 1962 declared that May 15th would be known as National Peace Officers Memorial Day. Now, we take the week of May 15th to recognize our fallen officers who gave the ultimate sacrifice in the line of duty in the name of protecting and serving.

- + These officers are fathers, mothers, sons, daughters, brothers and sisters.
- + These officers took an oath to serve their community knowing that ultimately giving their lives could be their fate, and they did it anyway.
- + These officers knew the risk, knew the odds and knew that they may be hated along the way.
- + These officers ignored all of that because they also knew that they had a duty, a calling and the heart of a hero.

Last year in 2022, the number of duty related deaths hit 164 (246 if you factor in COVID-19 deaths). Of those, 60 were murdered by intentional gunfire and another 14 were killed by intentional vehicular assault.

Regardless of statistics, it does not matter how these heroes left us, what matters is how they lived FOR US.

Now more than ever, these officers need our support. When you get an opportunity, thank an officer because they suit up every day knowing it may be their last...for YOU.
