
ADOPT A STORM DRAIN

Did you know storm drains feed directly into our local lakes and rivers, unfiltered? That's why it's so important to adopt a drain and keep them clear for cleaner and healthier water.

Here's how easy it is:

1. Find a drain to adopt near you at <https://adopt-a-drain.org/>
2. Name your drain. Bonus points for fun or creative drain names!
3. Take a few minutes to clean up the street and sidewalk near your drain if needed. Dispose of the debris properly (we show you how to do that too)
4. Report the amount you collect on your Adopt-a-Drain account
5. Repeat as necessary, we recommend about 2x/month
6. Email report to the City to publicworks@dupontwa.gov so we can say **Thank You** for helping out!!

Backflow Device Testing


With warmer temperatures right around the corner, the City of DuPont's water division staff is focusing on backflow.

More than 1500 backflow devices are scheduled for testing during the months of March, April, May, and June, aligning with the start of the irrigating season.

Washington State DOH requires that ALL in-service backflow preventers be tested annually. (Whether in use or not).

Certified city staff are testing backflow devices to comply with Washington State regulations and to ensure our devices are ready should backflow conditions occur.

Why pick up after my dog?

1 Common Courtesy – When you take your pet off of your property, you are entering public shared space. It is the duty of pet owners to ensure that they pick up after their pets.

2 Bacteria and parasites such as salmonella, fecal coliform, and giardia, can be spread by contact with infected dog waste – It can take up to one year for dog waste to completely decay, but even afterwards parasite eggs can linger for years in the soil – harmful for pets and humans.

3 Your lawn mower doesn't help and in fact can make it worse – Mowers will actually chop up the waste into smaller pieces and spread it further throughout your yard where people continue to step in it and then bring it home.

4 It's Natural Like Cows, It's Fertilizer – Not True! This is a common misconception. Not all piles of poop are created equal (diets and digestive systems differ). Dog waste is so high in nitrogen and phosphorus that it can have the opposite effect of fertilizer.

5 Dog waste is considered a contributor to stormwater pollution – Dog poop left out can wash into storm drains, lakes, and streams, potentially harming aquatic life.

Community News from Northwest Landing ROA

Trees with invasive roots removed

We love trees here in Washington - especially the ones that herald spring with lots of colorful blossoms. But some of those beautiful blooms are produced by trees that are considered to be invasive. The roots of cherry trees, for example, will buckle sidewalks and undermine building foundations. Another popular tree - Bradford pear - has been banned in several states because it is invasive and competes with native trees.

Many housing developments - including Northwest Landing - have trees that grow fast and are pretty...for awhile. The builder began construction at Northwest Landing 30 years ago. Many of the trees that were planted in Palisade Village, the first neighborhood in Northwest Landing, are now in need of removal and replacement with more suitable trees.

Northwest Landing Residential Owners Association has begun such a project on properties where trees are destroying underground sprinkler systems and might eventually undermine foundations of nearby homes. Northwest Landing owns and maintains more than 150 "green spaces," most that have grass, shrubs and trees, and a few have protected "heritage" trees, most often Garry oaks, which were here before building began. One greenspace, on Bobs Hollow Lane, had 7 flowering cherry trees with roots so large that they were damaging property of at least one nearby home, and heading toward others. We did not want to remove them, but we had an arborist look at them, and their recommendation was to remove them as soon as possible before they cause any more damage. Cherry trees generally live about 30 years and these trees were near the end of expected lifespan.

There will be new trees planted in that area, likely in the fall that are known to have less-invasive root systems. Several residents expressed dismay about the cherry trees being removed. There are several other areas where people can enjoy flowering cherry trees, including along Barksdale in the Historic Village and adjacent to Chief Leschi Park on Brown Avenue.

This Memorial Day, let's pay tribute to the heroes who made the ultimate sacrifice for our freedoms. Join the JBLM-DuPont wear blue: run to remember chapter and our community as we take purposeful steps to honor the over 65,000 service members killed since the Vietnam War. Together, we'll run with purpose and remembrance on May 27, 2024.

While formal remarks start at 9:00 a.m., we will have food and drink beginning at 8:00 a.m. Bring a picture to post on the memorial wall. wear blue merchandise will be sold at 8:15 a.m.

Parking at the PowderWorks Parking lot will be reserved for volunteers and community service providers, so please plan accordingly.

Our 5K run/walk will start in waves after the formal remarks. Our Gold Star Youth and their Mentors will begin our run. We encourage faster runners to start near the front and walkers or families with strollers start near the end. The route will be clearly marked and Champion Centre will provide course marshalling for safety and direction. This is not a formal race with timing or medals but a community event of active remembrance.

Our route will return to the Park where will be treated to hot dogs, chips and water by the DuPont's GraceWorks Church.

Community News

Operation ELEVATE is our school district's newest Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA) grant. DoDEA grants aim to enhance educational outcomes, reduce achievement gaps, and offer academic programs for districts with a high number of military-connected students. The district was awarded \$1.5 million dollars in September of 2023 to fund literacy initiatives for the next five years.

Operation ELEVATE's primary goal is to address the challenges students face in achieving literacy growth. The plan involves implementing a sustainable system of effective classroom instruction that aligns with collective teacher efficacy conditions. Operation ELEVATE's primary focus is on evidence-based, early literacy enhancements in K-5 classrooms. Technically, the 2023-24 school year is designated as the planning year of the grant, however our staff is already progressing toward grant goals and making a difference for students. This year, we have accomplished:

- An early literacy pilot through University of Florida Literacy Institute (UFLI)
- A pilot at Pioneer Middle School for Lexia PowerUp reading intervention
- 18 of our teachers are enrolled in Dyslexia Certification coursework through Pacific University
- Before and after school Literacy Labs at Cherrydale, Chloe Clark, and Saltar's Point
- Multiple professional development opportunities for our staff
- Professional development planned for August 2024

Upcoming grant goals over the next 4 years include:

- 6-12 English/Language Arts curriculum update/adoption
- K-12 curriculum updates/adoption
- Professional development for staff
- Additional Literacy Lab opportunities for K-5 students
- Materials to implement UFLI at our primary schools



Steilacoom Historical School District is one of 19 school districts awarded last year. This is the district's 5th DoDEA grant award and we are extremely excited for our literacy work to make a positive impact on the students we serve.

The Steilacoom Historical School District will be changing the times for **school zone lights** in the City of DuPont effective May 6, 2024. Based on a review of other school district practices, and in an effort to create more consistency within the school district, school zone lights will be activated on the following schedule:

Chloe Clark Elementary

AM: 8:35 a.m. to 9:15 a.m.
PM: 3:25 p.m. to 4:05 p.m. (M, T, Th, F)
Wed PM: 2:25 p.m. to 3:05 p.m.



Pioneer Middle School (including Center Drive and Bob's Hollow Lane)

AM: 7:40 a.m. to 8:20 a.m.
PM: 2:30 p.m. to 3:10 p.m. (M, T, Th, F)
Wed PM: 1:30 p.m. to 2:10 p.m.

The intent of the changes is to have school zone lights activate in the morning 30 minutes before the start of school and stay on until 10 minutes after school starts. In the afternoon, the lights would activate 10 minutes before the end of school and stay on 30 minutes after the end of the school day. Whenever school is not in session, the district plans to deactivate the school zone lights, including during Spring Break, Winter Break, other scheduled non-school days, and snow days.

The district is working with the Town of Steilacoom to make similar changes in the near future.
