NEWS FROM PATROL

- After running the license plate of a vehicle located at a local business, it was determined that the driver was operating the vehicle with a suspended license. The driver also had an outstanding warrant and was ultimately arrested and booked into jail.

Spring has arrived, and that means bears are coming out of hibernation all over the state. DPD has received reports of bear sightings in the Hoffman Hill area of DuPont.

Bears tend to avoid humans; however, prevention is the best advice. Removing access to food sources is a good way of discouraging bears from being in the area. Pet food, bird feeders and unsecured trash are some of the things that could attract a bear. When possible, put your garbage out shortly before the truck arrives.

If you're walking the DuPont trails, never travel alone, always keep small children near you, keep pets on a leash, and always make your presence known by talking or making loud noises. Report any sightings to 9-1-1 and remember to keep a safe distance if you encounter a bear.

What do bears love to eat?

Bears aren't out to cause problems. Black bears are very smart and super-resourceful, and will do their best to take advantage of all the easy-to-get-at calories we make available:

- ◆ Accessible garbage and trash
- ◆ Bird seed, suet, hummingbird feeders
- ◆ Fruit trees, gardens, natural food sources
- ◆ Chickens and small livestock
- ◆ Pet food, horse and livestock feed
- ◆ Barbecue grills, coolers, outdoor refrigerators
- ◆ Scented personal care products, scented candles, air fresheners
